LIT FEST-2019

'As You Like It', the English Club of Delhi Public School, Gurgaon, organized the Lit Fest 2019, ideated by the Director Principal, Ms Aditi Misra, on 20th July 2019. The theme for the event was East meets West-A Literary Connect. A variety of activities were held that gave a creative platform to the students to explore their latent talent and gave wings to their imagination.

'Guess Who' gave the students of class VI an opportunity to connect with their favourite authors and characters lending credence to the power wielded by books. An expansive vocabulary is an asset and 'What's the Good Word' gave students of class VII a chance to learn new words through various clues. 'Proverbs in a Bag' familiarized students of class VIII with the popular proverbs of the English Language. The activity was both challenging and informative. Poetry is considered as the crown of literature. Students of class IX and X explored this facet of English literature through the activities 'Poetry Magic' and 'Ornamental Limerick' respectively.
