Main highlights of the webinar:

- Value Education is important as it leads to holistic development of the child.
- Values should not be treated as ideal concepts but as empowering tools which are helpful in meeting the challenges of the contemporary social world.
- Value Education helps the students to become more and more responsible and sensible. It helps them to understand the perspective of life in a better way and lead a successful life as a responsible citizen.
- Case studies were shown to emphasise that Value Education is needed for all specially in the formative years.
- Attitudes and skills cannot be taught and should be interwoven in the curriculum.
- Values can't be taught as a subject but need to be inculcated through the situations deliberately planned while teaching various subjects. Role of the teachers becomes imperative to ensure that values are interwoven in the lesson plans.
- The NEP 2020 also emphasizes that the 5 universal values of Truth, Peace, Non Violence, Love and Righteous conduct should be imparted to the children.
- The Indian Constitution also mentions integrating values into the curriculum through poems, stories, group discussions, debates, co-scholastic activities etc.
- A framework for conducting a value education activity should be ready.
- To break the monotony mass media can be brought in the class.
- Testimonials and videos shared, showed what the children had imbibed and the importance of meditation and Vipasana as well as values like forgiveness and self-healing.

Takeaways:

- Tasks for the weekend could be shared in the monthly calendar like cleaning the toy room, washing the socks or handkerchief or folding clothes that would help the child to learn how to be organised and self-reliant.
- An effective methodology to impart Value Education is to incorporate it in the lesson plans.

• The best ways to incorporate values in school curriculum is through Role plays, Morning Assemblies, Clubs/Societies, House Council, Group Studies, Projects and Debates on value based topics.

Everyone agreed to the idea that Value Education has to be interwoven and not taught as a separate subject.
